The overseas Chinese policies have been developed strongly based on the concepts that "overseas Chinese are the mother of revolution" and that "if there were no education for overseas Chinese, then there would simply be no overseas Chinese affairs".</li> <li>The objective of the overseas Chinese education policies is to train overseas Chinese to become professionals with a Chinese cultural background and global perspective. The Regulations Regarding Study and Counseling Assistance for Overseas Chinese Students in Taiwan have therefore been formulated to encourage young overseas Chinese to study in Taiwan and to use the knowledge and skills they gain to serve and increase prosperity within their communities.</li> <li>The education of overseas Chinese students in Taiwan over the years has been very successful, especially the result of the efforts made to promote overseas Chinese students' identification with the ROC and to solicit their help to expand the ties between Taiwan and their respective overseas communities. The Government will therefore continue to value and prioritize its overseas Chinese education policies, steadfastly maintain its policy intention of looking after overseas Chinese students, and continue the measures which confer preferential status on overseas Chinese students, thereby</li> </ol>

(1) Goal: To give young overseas Chinese the practical knowledge and skills to help them develop
agricultural, industrial, and commercial businesses, and increase prosperity within their communities.
(2) Features: all OYVTS training courses are designed to prepare students to enter a particular vocational
field. Practical training makes up 70% of the program for the industrial and agricultural courses, and
classroom lectures make up 30%. Classroom lectures and practical training are both given equal
importance for the commercial and business courses. The principle is to ensure that students acquire
the skills required to succeed in their particular field.
(3) Training period: all courses consist of a two-year program, conducted over four semesters (including
practical training on campus).
(4) Eligibility details:
a. Overseas Chinese under 40 years of age who have completed at least second-year of senior
secondary school; this age limit may be extended for female applicants with children by two years
for each child, with a maximum age limit of 45. Documentary evidence of their number of children
must be attached.
b. People born overseas who are citizens or permanent residents of their country of birth or who
have an "Overseas Chinese" stamp in the ROC passport which they held when they left Taiwan.
c. People who are physically sound, of good character, and without harmful indulgences.
d. People who are able to speak Mandarin and take notes in Chinese.
Those who meet the above criteria may apply for consideration. The best-qualified applications will
be offered a place until all quotas are filled.
(5) Units which Forward Applications: ROC embassies and consulates, representative offices, liaison
offices, or other organizations with authorization from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, or overseas
Chinese community associations authorized by the OCAC.
(6) Expenses:
a. Applicants who are accepted into a program are responsible for their own medical insurance, ROC
National Health Insurance fees, miscellaneous fees, food and accommodation, practical training
material costs, and airfare transportation expenses incurred while they are studying.
material cosis, and arrais d'ansportation expenses incurred while they are studying.

b. Students do not need to pay tuition fees; these subsidies are paid by the OCAC as a regular budge
allocation.
(7) Counseling and assistance:
a. Scholarships are available for outstanding OYVTS students.
b. Discretionary funding is available to subsidize part-time work opportunities on campus for OYVTS students.
c. Discretionary funding is available to subsidize OYVTS students' National Health Insurance premiums.
d. Discretionary funding is available to universities to subsidize hosting various useful activities an social events for OYVTS students.
e. Discretionary funding is available to subsidize on-campus medical care, emergency assistance and treatment for current OYVTS students.
f. Discretionary funding is available to subsidize individual universities or regions to hol graduation ceremonies, exhibitions of students' work, and farewell parties.
(8) Completion of studies:
<ul> <li>a. In accordance with the regulations, each university running OYVTS courses must issue bilingual OYVTS Program Completion Certificate, in Chinese and English, to every OYVT student who completes their program with satisfactory results.</li> </ul>
b. Students who have obtained the prescribed number of academic credits and have satisfactor results may be issued an academic credit certificate by the university running their course, accordance with the Regulations for Junior Colleges, Colleges and Universities for
Implementation of Continuing Education. Students who have not completed all of the prescribe number of academic credits may be issued a Certificate of Attendance.

receipts and inventories when the payments are audited. Each school, college, and university must
verify the use of the funding; it may only be used for this specific purpose. They must also ensure
that the part-time work does not interfere with students' academic activities and is in an appropriate
environment, and may formulate its own implementation rules and send a copy to the OCAC for
reference.
4. Funding for emergency relief and assistance in the event of family misfortune or bereavement:
(1) The OCAC has established the Directions of Medical, Emergency and Funeral Assistance for
Overseas Chinese Students studying in Taiwan to sympathetically look after overseas Chinese
students studying in Taiwan in the event they need medical care, meet disaster, or a death occurs.
These directions also apply to students currently studying at a school, college, or university in
Taiwan in accordance with the Regulations for Hong Kong and Macao Residents Studying in
Taiwan.
(2) In the event that an overseas Chinese student studying in the Taiwan region needs to be hospitalized
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			because of injury or illness, thereby causing major financial difficulties; or their family meets some
